Intent of the Security Assessment

- 1. Provide evidence-based planning in effort to advise the Board of Commissioners on security strategies that will improve public safety in the French Quarter
- 2. To seek an objective assessment of current security throughout the French Quarter
- 3. Developed matrix for safety and security accountability

Isolated incidents create distorted, negative images of the French Quarter and the city as a whole; moreover, there are recurring violations that perpetuate the deteriorated image of the French Quarter 'experience' and undermine long-term economics. Our strategies must evolve from basic neighborhood policing tactics to be a more tourism-oriented policing/protective services to address the social and financial aspects attached to the French Quarter.
