2. Public Comment

No written public comment was received.

3. Approval of previous meeting notes

Ms. Hegenberger made a motion to approve the previous meeting notes. Mr. Bilby seconded motion and it was approved.

4. Committee Chair's Comments

a. Introduction on Captain Walls, incoming Eighth District Commander Captain Walls introduced himself and noted this was his first day back as Commander of the Eighth District and he is already getting messages from stakeholders. He provided his contact information: 504-339-5246 jhwalls@nola.gov. Committee members noted concerns including drag racing, illegal vending, and parking on

the Esplanade neutral ground. Captain Walls noted that the officers of the Eighth District have a great clearance rate on violent crime, above national average. Auto burglaries and theft are up. He wants to add another Quality-of-Life officer and more mounted police on Bourbon Street. He noted that in August the low barrier shelter will go from 100 beds to 300 beds for the homeless population.

- b. Recap of District Attorney Williams presentation actionable items Ms. Cooper noted that Mr. Emory will be providing an update on follow up conversation with DA Williams when he is back next month.
- 5. Presentation Presentation and discussion of supplemental French Quarter police patrols and the French Quarter Task Force program. To Present: Sergeant Jamie Roach Sergeant Roach presented the attached slide deck. She noted that the patrols are down 1-2 vehicles, and they are using marked patrol cars until new vehicles are purchased. They patrol officers are tracked with GPS to assure that they are continuing the patrol per the patrol plan. Sergeant Roach reported that they removed one officer from the pool. Some officers are now taking vacation after working straight through the COVID-19. Ms. Cavett asked that Sergeant Roach provide specific shifts that are not filled and why. Sergeant Roach noted that when shifts are not filled she personally monitors the app and will send calls to dispatch.

Mr. Simms provided an update for the City on vehicle status: Vehicle 4 is done. Vehicle 5 a/c is out and can only be used at night or when not raining, Vehicle 6 is at Mercedes Benz, the Polaris can only be used when not raining. The City is buying new vehicles when the make year turns over to 2022 models on July 1st with French Quarter Improvement Fund dollars including Chevy Traxes and Polarises.

6. Discussion by Committee with Travelers Aid Society of Greater New Orleans Needs Assessment of Street Homeless: Led by Angela Owczarek

Ms. Owczarek provided a draft of the homeless survey that field surveyors will utilize. They can start surveying in a week, depending on weather. Mr. Simms will provide data from the app. There is a meeting with NOPD Quality of Life officers scheduled after this meeting.

- 7. Discussion by Committee of public safety initiatives:
 - c. SafeCam Platinum: To present Ross Bourgeois

Mr. Bourgeois reported that the City Council appropriated money for crime cameras throughout the City, including additional infrastructure and personnel staff. November 2017 they opened the Real Time Crime Center (RTCC) and now have about 1,000 public and private cameras feeding into the RTCC. He will confirm that the VCC has a streamlines no cost application from the installation of private crime cameras. He provided brochures to the committee.

d. Hide, Lock, Take: To present - Jane Cooper

Ms. Cooper reported that there are three needs to proceed with the program:

- 1. Louisiana Department of Insurance to fund the signs
- 2. City agree to put the signs on public poles
- 3. FQMD Board to support
- e. Dusk to Dawn Keep It On: To present: Karley D. Frankic

Ms. Frankic presented a draft revision of the Dusk to Dawn flyer and asked the members to provide feedback to her before presenting to the Board of Commissioners.



8. New Business

No new business was discussed.

9. Next meeting date

The next scheduled meeting of the committee is July 19th at 2:00 pm at the Hotel Monteleone.



SAFECAM PLATINUM FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

• WHAT IS SAFECAM PLATINUM?

SafeCam Platinum, launched in December 2018, is a joint initiative of the City of New Orleans and the New Orleans Police & Justice Foundation, a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization. The program represents a publicprivate partnership which allows the public to install security cameras on their home or business that are directly connected with the City of New Orleans Real-Time Crime Center (using an existing internet connection and a subscription to a cloud storage platform).

• WHAT IS THE REAL-TIME CRIME CENTER? WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF SUCH A FACILITY?

The City of New Orleans Real-Time Crime Center (RTCC) opened in late 2017 as a state-of-the-art facility operating under the City of New Orleans Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness that leverages technology to provide critical information to first responders in the field and assist with investigations of criminal activity or other quality of life concerns such as severe weather-related hazards and potential street flooding. The RTCC also utilizes technology to make public safety personnel most efficient and effective. For example, in 2018, more than 3000 manpower hours were returned to the NOPD officers while aggregating and coordinating public safety efforts.

• WHY SHOULD I PARTICIPATE IN SAFECAM PLATINUM?

SafeCam Platinum represents a unique partnership between the City of New Orleans and the public. The City currently manages pole-mounted public safety cameras (often with red and blue lights) throughout Orleans Parish that connect to the Real-Time Crime Center. However, now the City needs the public's help to increase its network of coverage. Participating in SafeCam Platinum allows you to play a role in public safety and sends a clear message that you want to do your part to help make New Orleans a safer place to live, work, and visit.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF PARTICIPATING IN SAFECAM PLATINUM?

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• WHO OWNS THE CAMERAS? WILL I HAVE ACCESS TO THE FOOTAGE?

You own any cameras that you purchase, and you will have access to your live footage on your mobile device, laptop, etc. through a personal account (included in the monthly cloud storage fee). The City will be able to access the footage through the cloud platform on an as-needed basis (based on incidents as reported to the 911 Center).

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• WHAT ABOUT PRIVACY CONCERNS?

The City of New Orleans Real-Time Crime Center (RTCC) only accepts/integrates privately-owned cameras with footage of exterior, **public-facing** views. Also, although your SafeCam cameras will record 24/7, the RTCC will NOT monitor your cameras 24/7. SafeCam cameras are accessed by the RTCC based on the location of incidents reported to the 911 Center. Moreover, the RTCC does NOT employ facial recognition technology.

• HOW DO I INDICATE THAT I AM PARTICIPATING IN SAFECAM PLATINUM?

A SafeCam Platinum yard sign and window decal is available free of charge to any participant of the program indicating that the property is integrated with the City of New Orleans Real-Time Crime Center.

• WHAT IF MY SAFECAM CAMERA GETS DAMAGED OR DESTROYED?

Most SafeCam Platinum-compatible cameras come with a two- or three-year manufacturer's warranty. Your selected installer will have more details regarding potential insurance/repair plans for issues not covered by the manufacturer's warranty.

• ARE THERE DIFFERENT CAMERAS FROM WHICH TO CHOOSE?

Yes. The list of Genetec Stratocast Cloud supported devices can be found here. You may discuss details about camera options and pricing directly with your chosen installer.

• WHAT IF I HAVE EXISTING CAMERAS ON MY PROPERTY?

Some existing cameras may be compatible for RTCC integration with determination made on a case-by-case basis. For example, an encoder may be used to convert analog cameras for integration to the RTCC. You may discuss details regarding existing cameras with your selected installer.
