2. Public Comment:

No public comment was received at the conclusion of the reading of the agenda.

3. Approval of previous meeting notes

**Mr. Bilby made a motion to approve the previous meeting note. Ms. Cavett seconded the motion, and it was approved.**

4. Committee Chair's Comments

Easter was busy, reminds us of FQ Fest and national visibility of the neighborhood, sanitation was not good, but security was. Reviewing the 2022 work plan objectives. The expansion of the Royal Street Patrol, now known as the Upper Quarter Patrol has been successful. Will be

putting together a lighting summit with the Livability Committee and working on the FQEDD midyear budget adjustment. Mr. Bilby noted that there is a lot of lighting out in the Quarter. Isn't this the responsibility to maintain the lights? Ms. Story asked for a list of lights that are out. Mr. Bilby stated that it shouldn't be the responsibility to citizens to tell the City that their property is broken. **Ms. Story will ask the Dept of Public Works to look into it and ask Josh Hartley to prioritize.** Ms. Fulk reported that there are some light poles that are completely missing.

5. Presentation – Presentation of Eighth District Crime Statistics and the Supplemental Police Patrol Program. To Present: Lt. Samuel Palumbo

NOPD 8<sup>th</sup> District did not have a representative in attendance. See attached crime and SPPP statistics.

6. Presentation – Presentation on City Safety Coordination. To present: Courtney Story, City CAO Chief of Staff

Ms. Story reported New Orleans and Company is in the process of donating four more vehicles to the City for the supplemental police patrol program. The City is working with the state contract to procure Polaris. Does not know the status on the RFP for the traditional vehicles.

The app will go out for RFP. She thinks they will be reaching out to SEC for input on desired capabilities for the app. City will run the procurement process. **Ms. Cooper asked that City put request in writing so FQMD can provide an official response.**

Ms. Story had no update on the Bourbon Street bollards.

7. Presentation – Presentation on the French Quarter Economic Development District Agreement Monitors meeting. To present: Jane Cooper

a. Fiscal Year 2022 Mid-Year Budget Adjustment

Ms. Cooper reported that the midyear budget adjustment would be between \$300,000 and \$500,000. FQMD put out a public survey for input for feedback. See attachment. Ms. Cooper would like additional responses to inform the budget recommendations.

Mr. Bilby would like to see an enforcement team of officers and parking enforcement 24/7, starting with evening and weekends. Ms. Story said NOPD is working on deputization, provide within the next month training, will begin with existing employees, not new hires. Different city departments have different enforcement capabilities.

Ms. Cavett would like parking enforcement between 7 pm and 7 am and license plate readers. Mr. Bilby agreed. Ms. Cavett recommended Real Time Crime Cameras at 40 entrances and exits to the neighborhood. There are cameras at 8 now. Mr. Simms said it costs \$5,000 per camera.

Ms. Cooper recommended the homeless case management as provided by TASGNO.

Ms. Cavett recommended funding the Homeless Assistance Unit. Mr. Simms recommended 24/7

Ms. Fulk stated that there are too many guns. Ms. Cavett said that is an issue for the state legislature. Ms. Cavett is the vice-chair of the Government Affairs Committee.

## 8. Presentation – Presentation on the monthly report of the Upper Quarter Patrol, originally known as the Royal Street Patrol. To present: Matthew Pincus

See attachment for report. 350-370 hours per week staffed, should be able to maintain this high number through FQ Fest. Continue community policing with core principles, officers continue to go into businesses, using the same officers so there's a relationship being forged and people know them by name. Trying to assure owners and employees into their businesses in the mornings. The 100 block of Royal has been an issue so is a focus and is providing additional man hours there.

Mr. Simms asked about 700 block of Canal. Mr. Pincus said that was also a focus. Caputo asked about he DDD is supposed to have an assigned officer in the 100 block of Royal and 700 of Canal.

Mr. Ellestad said there was video of UQP officers' interaction around Royal Street barricades on the pedestrian mall. He is working with Deputy Chief Westbrook at NOPD Public Integrity. Mr. Pincus stated that artists were moving ad hoc basis and blocking traffic illegally. The pedestrian mall has not been in effect since the Hard Rock Hotel collapse will reopen. Mr. Pincus noted that the pedestrian mall is in effect at the discretion of the commander of the 8<sup>th</sup> District. Ms. Frankic reported that the mall will reopen on 4/25. Ms. Holmes asked how businesses and residents were notified about the reengagement of the pedestrian mall. Mr. Simms said Community Liaison Officers announced it at the MAX meeting and said they went door to door. Ms. Holmes said that some businesses reported not being contacted. **Ms. Cooper suggested that at the next meeting Sgt. Boudreau provide a report on how the pedestrian mall is working.** Mr. Caputo asked who is responsible for mobilizing the barricades. **Ms. Story will follow up on Eric Smith on his research into who is responsible for the barricades.** Mr. Ellestad asked if the SPPP could mobilize the Royal Street barricades.

Mr. Caputo asked if there was any information on street closures for FQ Fest. Ms. Frankic said not city announcements have been made yet.

## 9. New Business– To consider and take action upon any other matters that may properly come before the French Quarter Management District Security and Enforcement Committee

**Ms. Cavett Asked if the City can return the money from the French Quarter Improvement Fund to New Orleans & Company for the vehicles that they purchased and are going to purchase? Ms. Story will consult the legal team.**

Mr. Bilby asked is the SPPP cars could state stopping the cars and address people doing illegal activities and not just respond to calls for service. Mr. Simms and Ms. Frankic said that is what the SPPP is tasked to do.

10. Next meeting date: 16 May 2022

The next scheduled meeting of the committee is Monday, May16th at 2:00pm.

11. Adjournment

Ms. Hegenberger made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Mr. Bilby seconded the motion, and the meeting was adjourned at 3:20 pm.

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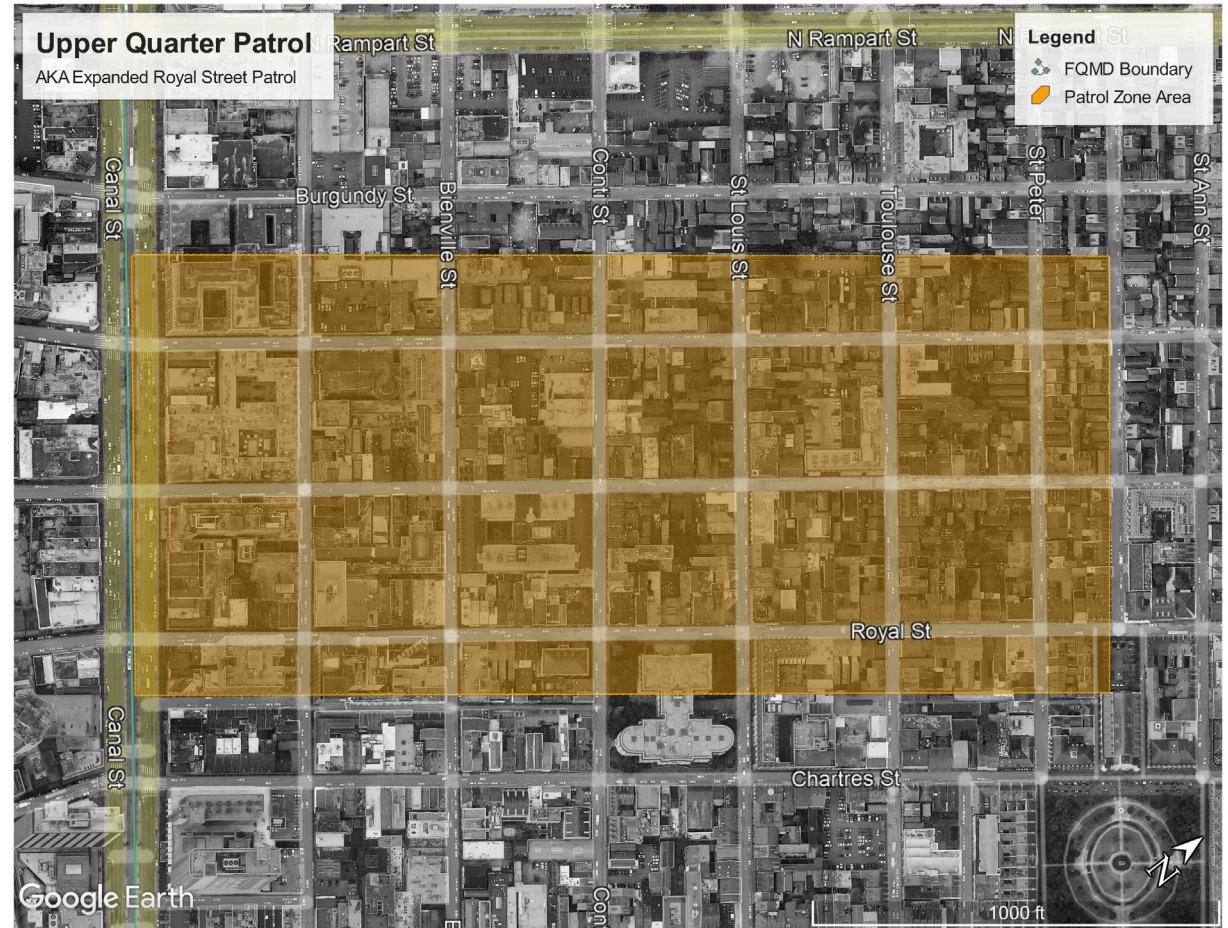
