1. Call to Order, Reading of the Agenda, and Roll Call

2. Public Comment:

No written public comment was received.

3. Approval of previous meeting notes

Frances Hegenberger motioned to approve the previous meeting notes. Glade Bilby seconded the motion, and it was approved.

4. Committee Chair's Comments

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a. Welcome 2024 Committee Chair and Vice-Chair

Jane Cooper announced that Christian Pendleton and Jessica Dietz will be taking over as Chair and Vice-Chair of the Committee in 2024.

b. Review 2023 Workplan

The committee reviewed the 2023 committee workplan noting that one third of the initiatives did not see progress while two thirds did. Crime cameras installation made progress, LPR installation was completed, and TASGNO street outreach was launched. The Supplemental Police Patrol Program (SPPP) app is out to bid now. A Code Enforcement inspector was hired last week. Jane Cooper said that a 2023 street light repair report was received from Eric Smith, but it does not have dates of disposition reports for the damages or repairs.

c. Discuss 2024 Workplan

Mr. Bilby said that he thinks the committee should double down on lighting as one of the most important things in 2024. The committee discussed prioritizing lighting in 2024. The committee discussed that the SPPP app should remain on the list, as well as Code Enforcement and traffic. Steve Caputo would like the new Code Enforcement inspector to report to the committee in 2024. Mr. Bilby asked if the new Code Enforcement Director could attend the next meeting and then every other month after. Mr. Pendleton recommended once a quarter. Ms. Frankic will follow up with Code Enforcement about attending the next committee meeting.

Mr. Pendleton said he would like The City to decide on and implement what the Bourbon Street bollards would be, likewise for the Royal Street pedestrian mall, with the City taking responsibility for mobilization so that NOPD does not have to use their valuable time.

Ms. Cooper discussed adding the expansion of the Upper Quarter Patrol (UQP) to the list in 2024.

Mr. Pendleton wants to support the 8th District so that it becomes the most desired assignment in the NOPD. Cpt. Roberts said that he thinks the 8th District is the most attractive district with the Governor Elect committing Louisiana State Police (LSP) and the expansion of the UQP. He does not think Constables are the answer; he wants to see POST certified officers the focus in the patrols. Cpt. Robert would like to free up some of his manpower for areas that need more attention. He has mounted patrol in the district now and is working with LSP for them to become certified as well. Cpt. Roberts stated that property crime and illegal vending will be a focus in the next year. He said that the 8th District is the heart of the City. There are other districts that need as much help as the French Quarter does, but officers want to come to work here. Ms. Cooper asked what the maximum officers in the 8th District would be. Cpt Roberts said he has 73 now but would like to have 100. He would like to beef up the Bourbon Promenade unit to do more proactive work. He will work with UQP to maximize the effort. He thinks that the SPPP will be filling more shifts with the proposed incentive pay and be competitive with the other details. Mr. Caputo asked about how to ensure the mounted patrol has cleanup behind them. Jessica Dietz recommended inviting Sgt. Harris to come to the committee to discuss.

Mr. Caputo asked if the committee could work with the judges to address the cost of the citations for illegal vending. Ms. Dietz and Mr. Bilby stated that they have gone to court several times this past year and they recommend having court monitors. Ms. Dietz said that Stay Away orders will be the key to success. She said the list of Stay Away orders needs to go to the individuals that are doing the sweeps so they can enforce those orders. Cpt. Roberts said they are scheduled to conduct another sweep on the 22nd with ATC. He thinks the Governor will beef up ATC's involvement in 2024. The Heath Dept is involved in the sweeps with their decibel reader each time. Ms. Cooper asked if was possible to get a report on which businesses are out of compliance. Cpt. Roberts wasn't sure if that was possible but would look into it. Mr. Bilby would like a master list so the committee can see where to focus. Alex Fein said he would talk to the French Quarter Business League about what they can do to help. Ms. Dietz noted that volunteer hours take a lot of personal time and would like additional support with court monitoring.

Ms. Cooper will work with the incoming leadership to draft 2024 workplan.

5. Presentation – Presentation of Eighth District Crime Statistics and the Supplemental Police Patrol Program. To Present: Sgt. Marc Boudreaux

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See attached report. One vehicle is out of service at this time. Ms. Cooper asked how December was looking for shifts filled. Sgt. Boudreaux said so far the month was looking on par, but filling mostly weekends now. Mr. Pendleton asked about the 2023 solved rates. Cpt. Roberts stated that crimes that have centralized investigation, such as rape are handled at headquarters and not tracked by the 8th District. Major crimes are down throughout the district with outstanding follow-up investigations closing cases.

6. Presentation – Presentation of Travelers Aid Society of Greater New Orleans Case Management November Report. To Present: Angela Owczarek

See attached report. Angela Owczarek reported that in the first eleven months of the street outreach program case managers have reached out to 236 unique individuals which is higher than the figure from the one-night count in the 2021 Homeless Needs Assessment. Ms. Owczarek said that there are a decent number of people moving in and out of the neighborhood. There have been 17 permanent move-ins so far this year. She reported that one individual that has been on the street for 20 years has been moved into permanent housing as a marker of meeting a long-term unmet need. She reported that since June the State has released very few housing vouchers so there are very few rental subsidies for the case managers to use to get people off the street. Ms. Owczarek said that TASGNO has gotten twelve people through all of the steps that are just waiting on vouchers, or other funds, to move into housing. Mr. Caputo asked if there was any discussion with the Governor Elect if the State staffing issue would be addressed. Ms. Owczarek wasn't sure if this was under discussion.

7. Discussion – Discussion by Committee of Launch of Travelers Aid Society of Greater New Orleans Rapid Rehousing Program.

Ms. Owczarek said there are twelve individuals ready now and the case managers were identifying more for the Rapid Rehousing program. Ms. Cooper asked which areas of the neighborhood they came from. Ms. Owczarek said that the first person is coming from Jackson Square. The individuals being identified to participate in the program will come through coordinated entry and will be prioritized based on those most vulnerable - having frequent contacts with the police, courts, hospitals, etc. Ms. Cooper asked for a timeline for expecting reports of people being housed. Ms. Owczarek said that she expects five to eight people approved in the first month and then TASGNO needs to identify the right apartment for them. Mr. Bilby asked if they identified 20 landlords yet. Ms. Owczarek said TASGNO has a list of landlords, not all in the French Quarter, but all clients will be from the neighborhood. Mr. Caputo said the program is dependent on TASGNO to identify the right people. Ms. Owczarek said that they are confident they will be able to meet that expectation. She will add an addendum page to the monthly report with the Rapid Rehousing data. She noted that the approved cost for a one bedroom with all utilities included is \$1,149.

8. Presentation – Presentation on the monthly report of the Upper Quarter Patrol. To present: Matthew Pincus

See attached report. Mr. Bilby asked if there are any problems with criminals being booked and charged by UQP officers. Mr. Pincus said that has not been a major issue. Mr. Pincus said that there is a hesitancy by victims to be a witness on an affidavit and show up in court. Cpt. Roberts said that the reason property crimes are on the rise is because the penalties are not high enough.

9. Discussion – Discussion by Committee of Launch of Expansion of the Upper Quarter Patrol

Ms. Cooper reported that the funds will be included in the State appropriation Cooperative Endeavor Agreement and she hopes to have the funds available before Mardi Gras. Mr. Pincus said his plan is to focus on, in coordination with Cpt. Roberts, weekends between 7 pm to 3 am and to add vehicles to existing walking patrols. He wants to source individuals with on the ground law enforcement experience to react to calls for service that assist NOPD to free up those officers. He said it takes a lot of work to find the right people from OPSO with these skills. Mr. Pincus said he is prioritizing communicating with the A and B Platoons to assure UQP can be mobilized to back up NOPD. Mr. Bilby asked what training Public Safety Services provided. Mr. Pincus said that he does train new officers and briefs officers on ongoing specific areas of concern. Cpt. Roberts confirmed that UQP cannot do traffic control. Mr. Pincus stated that all UQP officers have been through academies but need to know how to use the proper radios and be onboarded properly. Cpt. Roberts would like UQP to be able to respond to radios to help NOPD with incident response. Mr. Pincus said he is happy to be the radio point person until 3:00 am with the lineup each night

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shared between NOPD and UQP. Mr. Pincus said that the expansion focus will be on the 100-300 blocks of Decatur Street and 600-700 blocks of Canal Street with a lit-up vehicle in the median, on weekends and nights. There will be shifts in the patrol plan for major functions. Ms. Cooper said she would like to see a report on staffing per shift. Mr. Pincus agreed that was possible and would like to see “permanent” shifts with officers working regular shifts known to partners in the community.

10. Presentation – Presentation of Updates on City Safety Coordination Efforts by City Chief Administrative Office. To Present: Alex Dunkenberger

a. Supplemental Police Patrol App Request for Proposals and Contract Status

Eric Smith presented for Alex Dunkenberger. Mr. Smith reported that RFP is being extended for another two weeks. As of last Monday, of the four vendors that said they were planning to submit, only one submitted all the necessary information. The RFP will close by the end of the year, two weeks later the committee, made up of City employees, will rank and award the contract.

b. FQEDD Code Enforcement Inspector Hiring and Onboarding Status

Mr. Smith said there is an inspector had been hired and is now going through training. Ms. Cooper said that the committee would like to have the new inspector attend a meeting next year. Mr. Smith said he would like that to be the February meeting.

c. Supplemental Parking Enforcement Shifts Filled

No update was provided.

d. New Patrol Vehicle Wrapping and Light Installation Status

No update was provided on the three EVs and two Gators.

11. New Business– To consider and take action upon any other matters that may properly come before the French Quarter Management District Security and Enforcement Committee

Ms. Cooper asked Mr. Smith to present the streetlight repair report at the January meeting and asked that the Dept. of Public Works employee who worked on it to attend the meeting as well.

12. Next meeting date: 22 January 2024

The next scheduled meeting date is January 22nd at 11:00 am.

13. Adjournment

Ms. Dietz motioned to adjourn the meeting. Ms. Hegenberger seconded the motion and the meeting adjourned at 12:13 pm.

Outreach Successes and Challenges:

This month, the outreach team surpassed a cumulative of 1100 contacts with unhoused individuals in the first 11 months of this project, meaning out outreach staff is averaging just over 100 contacts per month (that are significant enough to record) with unhoused individuals living on the streets of the French Quarter. Given that prior to this project's start, TASGNO conducted a survey with unhoused individuals living in the French Quarter that found that on, average, unhoused individuals in the Quarter were interacting with social services on average only 0.9 times every six months, this represents a huge increase to the availability and provision of social services to this population. In this same time, our outreach team has averaged at least 10 monthly instances in each category of non-housing related services (connecting someone to some form of treatment, enrolling someone in public benefits, and obtaining someone's vital documents).

Additionally, the same individual whom we wrote about last month - who has been homeless in Jackson Square and Latrobe Park for almost twenty years (his first record of being homeless in the French Quarter was entered into the state system in 2004) was approved for a housing voucher in October. This individual is an older gentleman who struggles with literacy and who needed significant assistance to complete the housing application process. After viewing several

potential apartments with his outreach case manager in the last days of October, this gentleman moved into an apartment he liked in early November. Notably, he was the first individual interviewed for TASGNO's 2021 study on homelessness in the French Quarter, and our team is very happy to see him home after all this time.

Notably, the state voucher pause has continued to present a large challenge to our outreach workers and the clients whom they are trying to assist. Given that we have commented on this challenge since June, we will not comment on it at length again. Rather, we will note – now, all individuals whom the outreach workers have assisted to be matched to vouchers/rental subsidies (17 total) have successfully moved into housing, but more than 10 others have completed all steps of the housing application process and are waiting for a voucher/rental subsidy to be available to them.
