2. Public Comment

A written public comment was submitted regarding agenda item number 6B, and is attached following the meeting notes. Verbal public comments will be detailed within the meeting notes, coinciding with their correlated agenda item.

3. Motion – Consider a motion to approve the previous meeting notes

Glade Bilby made a motion to approve the previous meeting notes. Joshua Grippio seconded the motion, and it was approved.

4. Security & Enforcement Committee Impact Report*

a. French Quarter Patrol KPIs Reports–

See attached documents.

i. LA State Police (Captain Rodney Hyatt)

Cpt. Rodney Hyatt reported that, in May, the Louisiana State Police (LSP) troopers worked a total of 563 total hours (averaging 9.6-hour shifts), with Fridays identified as the busiest day. The detail resulted in 11 arrests, 18 charges, 178 calls for service cleared, and 356 homeless engagements, while also supporting significant operations such as the May 5th conspiracy case and a May 7th cellphone theft arrest. He noted that since January 27th, 1,274 hours have been used for the LSP detail, with an estimated 1,800 hours remaining for the rest of the year. The Committee's discussion centered on expanding LSP patrols in the French Quarter, particularly on weekends, where staffing shortages persist. Cpt. Hyatt recommended that increasing the hourly rate from \$75 to approximately \$100 could improve weekend scheduling. Committee Chair Christian Pendleton requested that the LSP officers return next month with a proposed incentive amount.

ii. Upper Quarter Patrol, Transport Unit (Deputy Constable Matt Pincus)

See attached document. Matt Pincus reviewed the latest Upper Quarter Patrol (UQP) report with the Committee. He noted that he has been working with Committee Vice-Chair Jessica Dietz to initiate a meeting with the Orleans Parish Sheriff to discuss having UQP Sgt. Loy Madrigal back on French Quarter details due to his valuable contributions to parking and traffic enforcement.

iii. Supplemental Police Patrol Program (Sgt. John Castelin)

See attached document. Sgt. John Castelin reported strong staffing and enforcement activity for the Supplemental Police Patrol Program (SPPP), including a 98% fill rate in April, arrests on Bourbon Street, and proactive narcotics enforcement that resulted in the seizure of large quantities of marijuana products and vapes. He stated that the implementation of Digi-Ticket devices has significantly increased parking enforcement, with citations rising from 39 in April to 385 in May. He noted a sharp increase in homelessness-related calls and visible encampments in the French Quarter, adding that City leadership has indicated that a new Quality of Life Task Force will address these issues, with additional enforcement and outreach efforts expected. Residents made public comments regarding their concerns on the increase of unhoused individuals in the neighborhood, as well as an increase in cyclists not obeying traffic laws. The Committee discussed the SPPP staffing levels and public safety coverage in the 8th District, noting that while the district now has 77 officers, only about 38 - 40 are assigned to patrols, leaving limited coverage on Bourbon Street despite supplemental personnel from partner agencies. Committee members raised concerns about the visible police presence and ongoing quality-of-life issues, including noise from slingshot vehicles with amplified speakers. Cpt. Sam Palumbo stated that the NOPD is reviewing existing ordinances with the City Attorney to determine what enforcement options are available, and the Committee requested an estimate of the number of officers needed to fully staff the district.

5. Discussions

2027 Project Priorities (new budget timeline goal: July 2026)*

See attached document. Mr. Pendleton reported that the FQMD will not be receiving State appropriations this year, which had exceeded \$1M in prior years. He emphasized the need to identify alternative funding sources for 2027. He asked the Committee members to develop program and budget priorities, as well as potential revenue options ahead of next month's Committee meeting, noting that the City will be preparing the 2027 French Quarter Economic Development District budget at the end of July.

6. Updates

a. FQ Task Force App Marketing Materials*

See attached document. Michelle Courseault noted that the marketing materials for the new and improved FQ Task Force app are available for all Committee members to distribute, and are currently being disseminated to French Quarter restaurants and hotels.

b. Unhoused Support

Ms. Courseault reported that the Office of Homeless Services & Strategy's unhoused services pilot program is still set to launch in July, with further updates expected at the next Committee meeting.

7. New Business– To consider and take action upon any other matters that may properly come before the French Quarter Management District Security and Enforcement Committee

No new business was discussed.

8. Adjournment

Mr. G. Bilby made a motion to adjourn. Maddie Charleston seconded the motion, and the meeting adjourned at 11:57 AM.

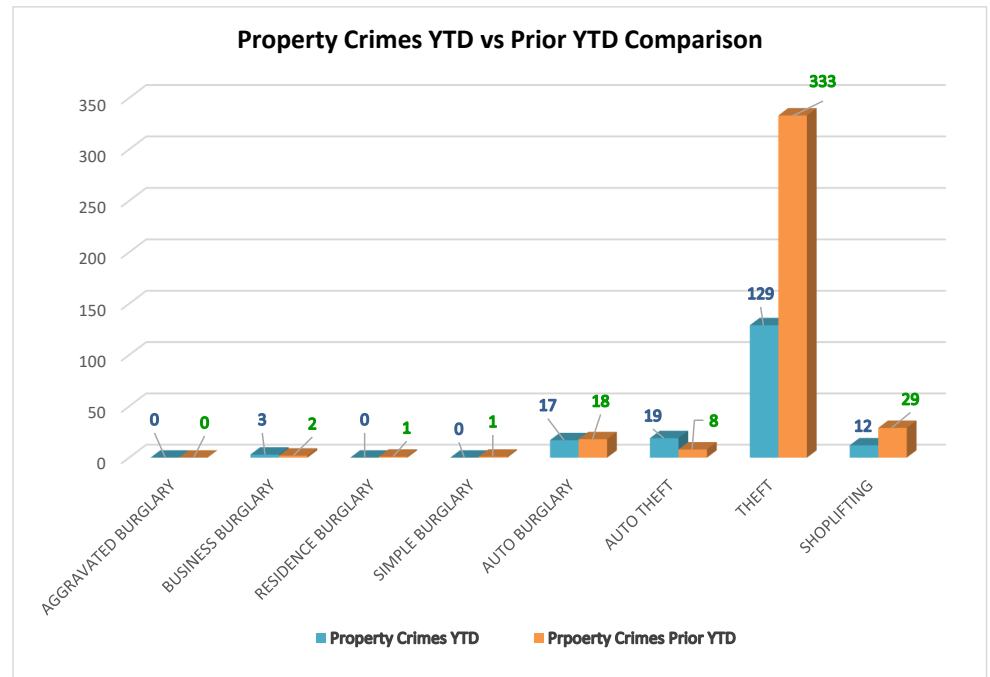
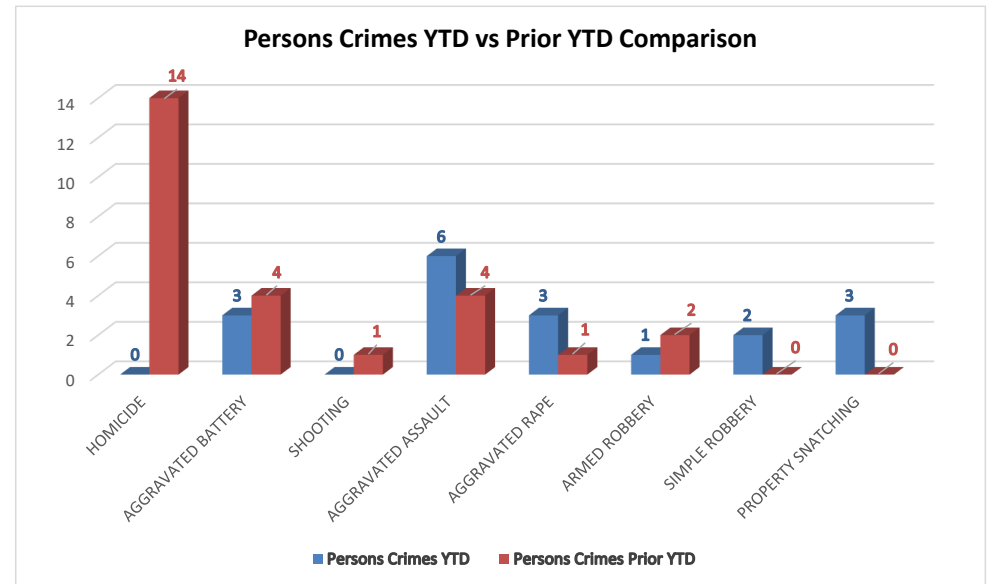

Summary of Month Activities

4/3/2026

On Friday, April 3, 2026, at approximately 8:25 AM, Sergeant Loy Madrigal along with Deputies Joseph Lodwick, Thomas Maag, and Vinton Bailey were on vehicle patrol in the lower French Quarter when dispatch advised of a white male standing naked in the 1800 block of Dauphine Street. Deputies responded to assist NOPD. Upon arrival, deputies observed a white male standing completely nude in front of 1814 Dauphine Street, which is a public area. The subject was later identified as Edward Barlow (DOB: 03/07/1985) of 7 Randazzo, St. Bernard, Louisiana. Due to his condition and behavior in public view, he was detained. His Miranda rights were read. During a search, deputies located multiple syringes in the subject's back pocket. One of the syringes appeared used and contained residue. When asked, the subject stated the syringe was used for methamphetamine. Deputies also recovered a small clear plastic bag with residue inside. Based on the investigation, the subject was found to be in violation of LRS 14:106 (Obscenity) for being fully nude in a public place and LRS 40:1023 (Possession of Drug Paraphernalia) for the syringes and related items. Edward Barlow was placed under arrest and transported for processing without further incident.

4/17/2026

On Friday, April 17, 2026, at approximately 8:20 AM, Sergeant Madrigal and Deputy Lodwick were on foot patrol in the 800 block of Decatur Street. While patrolling the area, they observed a male subject matching the description of a wanted individual for a home invasion. The subject was wearing dark pants, a brown shirt, a baseball cap, and was carrying large beads. Deputies made contact with the subject, who later identified himself as Anthony Miller by providing his first name and date of birth. When asked for identification, the subject was unable to produce any. Based on the information provided and the match to the description of the wanted individual, Sergeant Madrigal detained the subject without incident and notified dispatch. The subject was advised of his Miranda rights at the time of detention. Sergeant Madrigal then contacted Detective Shanay Howard to confirm the subject's identity. Detective Howard confirmed that the subject was the individual she was seeking in connection with the home invasion case. The subject was escorted on foot to the 8th District Station, where he was turned over to Detective Howard for further processing.

Summary of Month Activities

4/25/2026

On Saturday, April 25, 2026, at approximately 11:00 AM, Sgt. Madrigal and Deputy Lodwick were on vehicle patrol in the vicinity of Barracks Street and Royal Street when Sgt. Madrigal recognized a black male subject seated near the entrance of a bar. The subject was later identified as Durrell Green (DOB: 12/08/1995), who was wanted in connection with a vehicle burglary under NOPD item number D-01832-26. Deputies repositioned and later observed the subject walking toward the 700 block of Barracks Street carrying a pink backpack. Deputies approached the subject, at which time he fled on foot. A brief foot pursuit ensued, and the subject was apprehended without further incident in the 600 block of Frenchmen Street. The subject was detained, advised of his Miranda rights, and transported to the NOPD 8th District Station for processing. Prior to a search of his belongings, the subject stated that there was drug paraphernalia inside his backpack. A search of the backpack yielded the following items:

- One used glass pipe with white residue
- Two buds of green leafy substance (suspected marijuana)
- Six unknown pills (suspected MDMA)
- One clear bag containing a crystal rock-like substance
- Twelve credit cards bearing different names

The crystal rock-like substance was field tested at the 8th District Station using Kit Type A (Lot #1363124) under the supervision of Sgt. Alfred Harris, which yielded a positive result for amphetamine. All evidence was collected and submitted to Central Evidence & Property under Item Number D-25671-26. Additionally, one gold/silver chain with a pendant necklace related to NOPD Item Number D-01832-26 was also submitted into evidence. Durrell Green was booked accordingly for the below-listed charges:

- LRS 40:967 – Prohibited Acts (Schedule II Narcotics – Methamphetamine)
- LRS 40:966 – Prohibited Acts (Schedule I Narcotics – Marijuana)
- LRS 40:966 – Prohibited Acts (Schedule I Narcotics – MDMA)
- LRS 40:1023 – Prohibited Acts (Drug Paraphernalia)
- LRS 14:108 – Resisting an Officer

Summary of Month Activities

4/28/2026

On Tuesday, April 28, 2026, at approximately 1:17 PM, Deputy Conner Berthelot, a member of the Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office, while working an approved off-duty detail for the Upper Quarter Patrol, was dispatched to 215 Royal Street in reference to a Simple Battery (Signal 35) involving an unknown black female and an employee of Fischer-Gambino, identified as Christine Martin. Upon arrival, Deputy Berthelot observed a computer monitor visibly damaged on the employee desk where Ms. Martin was seated. Deputy Berthelot was then directed by the business owner, Laurie Little, to review the store's surveillance footage. Upon viewing the video, Deputy Berthelot observed an unknown black female, wearing a black shirt, black shorts, and carrying a black backpack, enter the business at approximately 12:32 PM. The female immediately proceeded to an employee-only area located in the bottom left-hand section of the store. The surveillance footage showed the female removing various items from a table located directly behind Ms. Martin's workstation, including food items and other miscellaneous objects. At approximately 12:33:19 PM, the female was observed accessing Ms. Martin's workstation and removing additional unknown items, which she concealed in her arms. Shortly thereafter, Ms. Martin returned from the rear of the business and immediately confronted the female. At approximately 12:34:14 PM, during the ensuing struggle, the female pushed Ms. Martin, causing her to fall to the ground. The female then turned toward the exit and forcefully pushed a ViewSonic desktop monitor off the desk, causing it to fall onto the floor. Deputy Berthelot subsequently obtained a statement from Ms. Martin. Ms. Martin stated that while walking across the sales floor toward the front desk, she observed the unknown female inside the employee-only area near a box used to store cash and customer receipts. Ms. Martin observed the suspect opening the box and immediately ordered her to leave. As Ms. Martin approached, she noticed the suspect holding several items, including a pack of cigarettes belonging to her. Believing the suspect had also taken items from the cash box, Ms. Martin grabbed the items from the suspect's hands. Ms. Martin advised that the suspect resisted and attempted to pull the items away. During the struggle, the suspect pushed Ms. Martin, causing her to fall to the ground. Ms. Martin further stated that the suspect was also holding a small white box, approximately three inches long and one inch thick, which Ms. Martin determined belonged to the suspect and returned to her. Ms. Martin stated that Laurie Little heard the commotion and came to the front of the store, yelling at the suspect to leave. At that time, the suspect pushed the computer monitor from the desk before fleeing the business on foot in an unknown direction. Ms. Martin complained of minor pain to her hip and knee as a result of the fall but declined medical attention at the scene. The interview was concluded at approximately 1:34 PM. Deputy Berthelot then canvassed the surrounding area in an attempt to locate the suspect but was unsuccessful. Photographs of the suspect were subsequently disseminated to other members of the French Quarter Detail and the Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office in an effort to identify and locate the individual, who remains unknown at this time. At approximately 4:20 PM Deputy Berthelot and Detective Neil Madrigal were conducting a proactive patrol in the 200 block of Royal Street when Detective Madrigal spotted the female suspect walking in front of the Fisher Gambino shop. When ordered to stop, the female then proceeded to flee from both Deputy Berthelot and Detective Madrigal. After a brief struggle, the deputies were able to subdue the resisting subject and place her in the back of a marked patrol car. The female was then transported to the 8th District station where she gave her name as Christina Pittman, and was booked under the following charges into the Orleans justice center: 14:35 Simple Battery, 14:56 Simple Criminal Damage, 14:59 Criminal mischief, and 14:108 Resisting an officer.

Summary of Month Activities

4/30/2026

On Thursday, April 30, 2026, at approximately 8:25 PM, Sergeant Tyrone Jones and Deputy Berthelot were assigned to the Upper Quarter Patrol detail when they responded to the 600 block of Frenchmen Street regarding a complaint of the illegal sale of nitrous oxide. Lieutenant Damon Harris of the NOPD advised that two individuals were actively engaged in the unlawful sale of nitrous oxide in the area. Sergeant Jones and Deputy Berthelot parked their marked patrol vehicle nearby and proceeded on foot to investigate. Detective Michael Gil advised that he had observed a black male wearing a black T-shirt with an orange graphic on the back, black shorts, and a gray baseball cap, attempting to sell balloons containing nitrous oxide to members of the general public. Detective Gil subsequently lost sight of the subject in the 600 block of Frenchmen Street. Upon arrival, Sergeant Jones and Deputy Berthelot observed a black male standing next to a black bag containing a nitrous oxide canister and numerous balloons. Lieutenant Harris then advised via telephone that this individual had been observed participating in the illegal sale of nitrous oxide. The subject was identified as Thompson and was detained without incident. He was placed in the rear of a marked Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office patrol vehicle for transport.

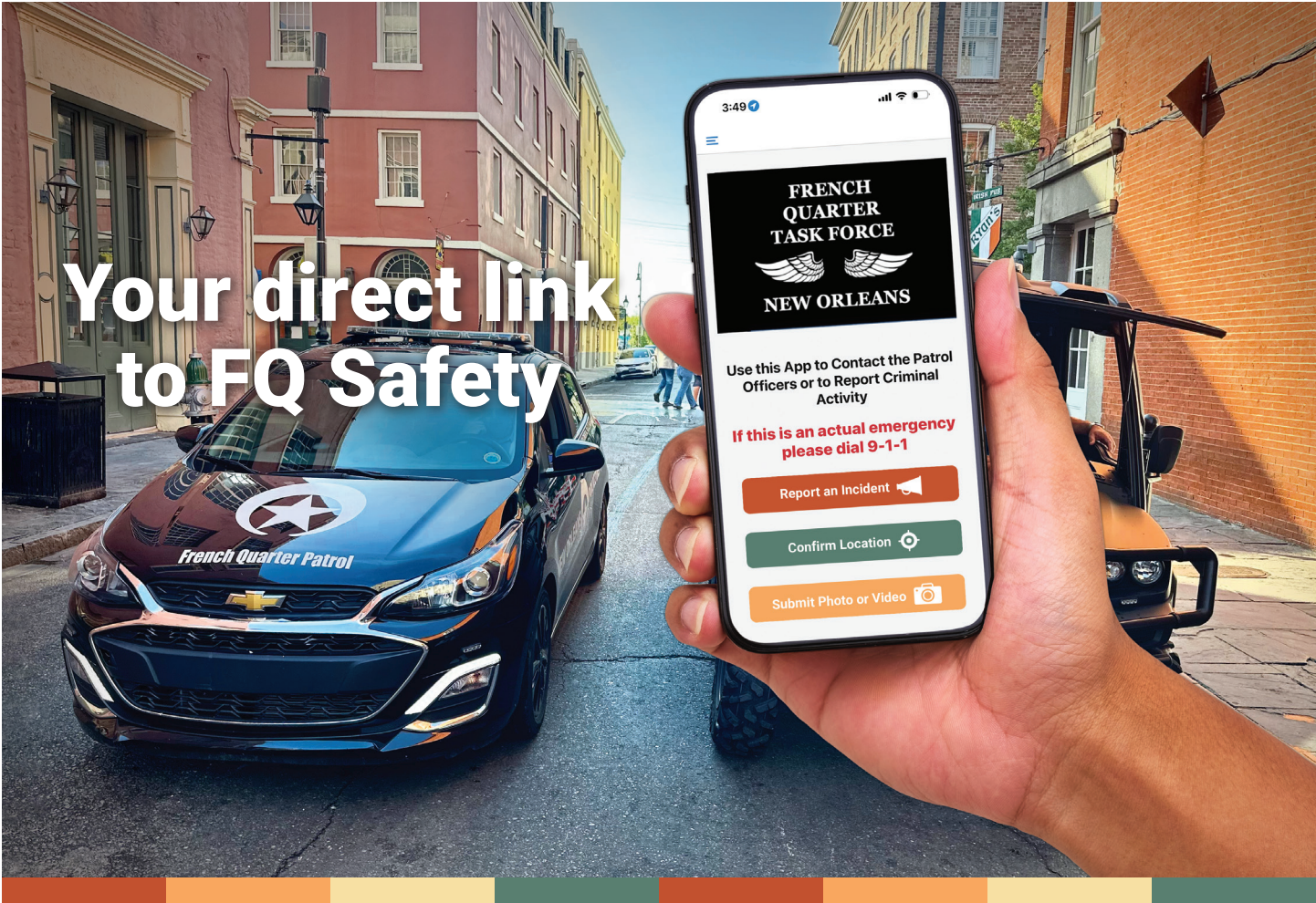
Deputy Berthelot then canvassed the surrounding area for the second suspect. Approximately one block away, Deputy Berthelot and Sergeant Jones located a male attempting to conceal his identity by changing articles of clothing. Both Sergeant Jones and Deputy Berthelot then detained the 2nd subject who was identified as Clarence Shelly of Georgia. Detective Gil responded to the location and made a positive identification of the subject, who was later identified as Clarence Shelley. Both Clarence Shelley and Thompson were arrested and transported to the Orleans Justice Center, where they were booked for the illegal sale and possession of nitrous oxide equipment, in violation of the City of New Orleans Municipal Code. Recorded video surveillance depicting both Shelley and Thompson selling and distributing nitrous oxide will be uploaded to Evidence.com
